COLEMAN, MILLARD FILMORE

September 15, 1859-December 29, 1930

Millard F. Coleman, well known Lander resident and one of the pioneer settlers of Wyoming, passed away at his home here Tuesday morning following an illness of extended duration. The deceased was in his 71st year and his demise was attributed to infirmities incident to advanced years.

The Coleman family came to Lander in 1919 from the Wheatland district where Mr. Coleman had been a rancher since coming to Wyoming in 1888. Failing health compelled him to abandon his ranching activities although he took much interest in affairs with which he was affiliated until recent months. Mr. Coleman was a native of Wisconsin where he grew to manhood. He was married in his home community and his wife accompanied him to Wyoming when he decided to locate in the west. Eight children were born to the union.

Mr. Coleman was a man of sterling qualities, a thrifty and progressive citizen and he held the esteem of a wide circle of friends. In the Wheatland district where the deceased lived for many years, and during his residence in Lander, Mr. Coleman won many friends who were grieved to know of his demise.

Wednesday morning, brief funeral services were held at the Coleman home with Rev. George Bird officiating. The body was then taken to Wheatland by train where services will be held at the Congregational church and interment will take place at the Wheatland cemetery. Members of the family accompanied the body.

Mr. Coleman is survived by his widow and the following sons and daughters: Glen, of Pinedale, Wyo.; Harry, Millard and Thomas, of Dwyer, Wyo.; Clark, of Glendo, Wyo.; Miss Mable who lives at home; Mrs. Loring E. Hines, Spokane, Wash. Mrs. Hines has been in Lander for several weeks assisting with the care of her father-Lander State Journal

Funeral services for Mr. Coleman were held here Friday noon from the Union Congregational church, Rev. R.E. Morgan officiating. The funeral was largely attended by old friends of the deceased and seven of the children and Mrs. Coleman. Miss Mabel, the eldest daughter, was unable to attend as she is ill in the Boulder Sanitarium in Boulder, Colorado.
