## GOODRICH, ROSE E. WARD February 26, 1868-December 10, 1922

The funeral of Mrs. G.T. Goodrich, held last Sunday at 2 p.m. from the Methodist Episcopal church, was very largely attended. Beautiful floral gifts and many sincere expressions of sorrow were indicative of the high regard in which the deceased was held. Burial took place in the Wheatland cemetery. As announced last week, death took place in Pasadena, Calif., on Sunday, Dec. 10, the body arriving here Thursday evening, accompanied by the husband.

Rose E. Ward was born near Mt. Ephraem, Ohio on Feb. 26<sup>th</sup>, 1868, and departed this life in Pasadena, Calif. Dec. 10<sup>th</sup>, 1922, at the age of 54 years, 9 months and 14 days.

She came with her parents to Greeley, Colo., in 1887. On June 13<sup>th</sup>, 1888, she was united in marriage to G.T. Goodrich. To this union were born five children, one dying in infancy and another, Mrs. Pearl Corbridge, dying in early womanhood. Those remaining are Mrs. C.D. Robinson, G. Ward Goodrich and Miss Dorothy Goodrich. In addition to these, there are left to mourn her departure, her bereaved husband, G.T. Goodrich, the mother, Mrs. M.J. Ward, one sister, Mrs. Olive Work, and two brothers, Fred and Frank Ward. Mrs. Goodrich came with her husband and family to Wheatland in the spring of 1897, and has since made this their home.

The deceased was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church and an earnest Christian woman, the impress of whose character was felt by all of with whom she came in contact. She especially delighted in the missionary work of the church. She organized and superintended the Queen Esthers, Mother Jewels, and the Home Guard, until failing health compelled her to relinquish the work.

Mrs. Goodrich was know throughout the state as a prominent member of the Order of the Eastern Star, which organization she joined in 1906. She was worthy matron of the local lodge in 1919 and a member of the grand lodge of Wyoming from that date until her death. She was also a charter member of W.T.K. and other social organizations of the city.

Early in September, she went to Pasadena, Calif., hoping that the change would benefit her health, but despite all that loving care and medical skill could do, she grew steadily worse, and last Sunday evening she passed peacefully away.
