Mrs. Mary E. Grant, 71, one of the early residents of Wyoming and a pioneer of this community for almost fifty years, died on July 16, at the home of her sister, Mrs. Mary McCord, in Pasadena, Calif. Mrs. Grant has not been in good health for some time, but her death, which was caused by a heart attack, came as a distinct shock to friends and relatives. Mrs. Grant had been in California for several months, hoping to benefit her health and in order to visit several brothers and sisters living in that vicinity.

Mary E. Regan was born in Union Springs, New York on March 17, 1866. Her parents had come to New York from Ireland and she was one of nine children. Her early days were spent in the State of New York.

In 1888, when Wyoming was still a territory, she came here to teach school. Here she met Duncan Grant and was married to him on January 3, 1892. Mr. Grant was engaged in the cattle business and owned a ranch on Sybille Creek about fourteen miles west of Wheatland, and it was on this ranch that Mrs. Grant spent most of her life. Mr. Grant passed away in 1932 and is buried at Wheatland.

Following Mrs. Grant's death, her body was returned to Wheatland and on July 21 she was buried in the Wheatland cemetery by the side of her husband. Funeral services were held at the Catholic Church. Arrangements were in charge of the Copley Funeral Home.

Mrs. Grant left to mourn her death four children, Margaret Crouter, of Denver, George Grant, Dorothy Grant and Agnes Grant, all of Wheatland, two grandchildren, George Crouter and Mary Margaret Grant and four brothers and sisters, Margaret McCord, Pasadena, Laura Pickens and John Regan of Ocean Park, Calif. and Robert Regan of Monrovia, Calif. Mr. McCord accompanied his sister-in-law's body from Calif. and was present in Wheatland for the funeral services.

Miss Agnes Grant was unable to attend the services, as she is recuperating from an operation in a Denver hospital.
