HARNSBERGER, MILLER C. May 1, 1901-December 14, 1953

The body of Miller C. Harnsberger was discovered last Friday, December 16, by Homer Clement, about one-half mile south of the junction south of Wheatland on the Laramie highway. From the time that the deceased was last seen alive, it is believed death occurred on December 14. An autopsy revealed that death was due to natural causes. Patrolman Karpinski and Coroner Ted. S. Schrader were called to the scene to investigate the death. Harnsberger had been making his home with his sister, Mrs. Charles Thrasher and Mr. Thrasher on their farm southwest of Wheatland, and he was apparently heading for the Thrasher home when he collapsed.

Mr. Harnsberger was born in Reck, Okla. on May 1, 1901, and was 51 years of age at the time of his death. He had lived here off and on the past several years.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. D.E. Gibson of Oklahoma City, Okla., and by four sisters, Mrs. Charles Thrasher, Wheatland, Mrs. Jessie Leftwitch, Portland, Ore., Mrs. J.E. Horn, Heraldton, Okla., and Mrs. Oma Kendrick, Norman, Okla.; also three brothers, Joy of Wheatland, John of Lindsey, Okla., and Edward of Willow Brook, Calif.

Funeral services were held at the Schrader chapel on Tuesday, January 20 at 10:30 a.m., the minister in charge being Mrs. Edward Harnsberger, sister-in-law of the deceased. Pallbearers were Joe Bowen, Eldon Randall, Henry Lofing, Manual Rodriquez, Jr., Felix Martinez, and Robert Newkirk. Burial was in the Wheatland cemetery.
