JOHNSON, JAMES ALBERT February 24, 1863-August 18, 1932

Another of the pioneer residents answered to the call to go "West", Thursday, August 18th at 8:40 in the morning when Albert Johnston, aged sixty-nine, passed on after a year of suffering caused by high blood pressure and uremic poisoning.

Mr. Johnson was born in Iowa, February 24, 1863. When about twenty-two years old, he came to Greeley, Colorado where he married Margaretha Larson. They made their home in Greeley until moving to Wheatland twenty-five years ago, which has been their home since. To them were born two sons, Robert and Ray, both of whom were here at the time of their father's death.

Mr. Johnson voted in the primary election Tuesday, being taken violently ill the same afternoon, going into convulsions until death came as a relapse. All that love and skill of friends could do to alleviate his suffering was of no avail. He is survived by his wife, sons, Robert and Ray, a little grandson, Robert, Jr., three brothers, George of Gilcrest, Wyoming, John of Greeley, Colorado, William P. of Iowa, two sisters, Mrs. Willis Thompson and Mrs. J.R. McLucas, both of Greeley, five nieces, Mrs. Charles Hightower, Mrs. Godfrey Kuehner, and Mrs. Lit Combs, all of Wheatland, Mrs. B.O. Nichols of Longmont and Mrs. Alice Nanney of Seattle, Washington. This is the third death in the Kuehner family in less than a month. Mr. Kuehner's brother died three weeks ago, Mrs. A. Armann, a cousin, July 27th, and now Mr. Johnson.

Funeral services were held in the Lyla Watson Funeral Home Saturday afternoon with Rev. R.E. Morgan in charge and burial made in the Wheatland cemetery.

Mr. Johnson was a skilled carpenter plying his trade until ill health compelled him to quit active work. He was a cheery, jovial disposition winning for him friends where ever he was known. His brothers, sisters and nieces with the exception of Alice Nanney were present at his funeral.
