He had amassed a large collection of draft horse equipment which he later sold at auction in Wheatland, attracting buyers from many states. Even though he spent the last 30 years in Arizona, Marvin's heart was always in Wyoming and he attended many Wyoming reunions in Phoenix.

Marvin was known for telling stories about the old days, and for his sense of humor, which he maintained until the end. He was a man of integrity and a devoted family man who enjoyed the time he was able to spend with his grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Marvin is survived by his wife June, and son, Alan Mills of Phoenix, daughter, Nancy Bachmann of Medford, Ore., grandchildren, Scott Bachmann, Dana Brownlee, and Leah Balsa, great-grandchildren, Reya and Kei Bachmann, Tyson, Cody and McKenzie Brownlee, as well as many nieces and nephews.
