Will later became a rural mail carrier and carried mail to Owen several times a week. He then worked in the oil fields in the McFadden area and there met and married Rose Burri in September of 1922. Rose was a school teacher in the McFadden area.

The couple homesteaded in Palmer Canyon west of Wheatland in Albany County. They raised their family there and continued to operate their ranch until they retired to Wheatland 10 years ago. Will was a 50 year member of the Wheatland AF and AM Lodge No. 16. He was active in the York Rite and the Commandary of the Masonic Lodge.

He is survived by three sons, Bill of Banden, Ore., Fred of St. Charles, Ill., and Budd of Rock River; one daughter, Geneva Marrs of Broomfield, Colo.; and two brothers, Frank and Dick Palmer and 14 granchildren and 18 great-grandchildren. One step-brother, Tom Palmer of Wheatland also survives. He was preceded in death by his parents, his wife, Rose; four sisters and two brothers.

Services were conducted today, Nov. 18 at 2 p.m. at the First Christian Church in Wheatland with the

Rev. Delbert Dick officiating.

Burial was in the Wheatland Cemetery. Masonic Graveside Rites will be conducted by the
